# INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF HELP LIMITED

(Incorporated in Hong Kong and limited by guarantee)

#### **Opinion**

We have audited the financial statements of HELP Limited ("the company") set out on pages 4 to 10, which comprise the statement of financial position as at 31 March 2023, the statement of income and general fund and the statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the company as at 31 March 2023, and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Hong Kong Financial Reporting Standard for Private Entities ("HKFRS for Private Entities") issued by the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants ("HKICPA") and have been properly prepared in compliance with the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance.

#### **Basis for Opinion**

We conducted our audit in accordance with Hong Kong Standards on Auditing ("HKSAs") issued by the HKICPA. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the company in accordance with the HKICPA's Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants ("the Code"), and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code. ## NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2023

#### 1 GENERAL

The company has been incorporated under the Companies Ordinance as a company limited by guarantee without share capital. The company's registered office is located at Unit 606, 6/F, 299QRC, 287-299 Queen's Road Central, Sheung Wan, Hong Kong. The principal activities of the company are to provide support for migrant domestic workers to gain access to justice and receive fair and equal treatment in Hong Kong.

Under the provision of its Articles of Association, every member shall, in the event of the company being wound up, contribute such amount as may be required to meet the liabilities of the company but not exceeding the sum of HK\$100 each.

#### 2 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### (a) Basis of preparation

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Hong Kong Financial Reporting Standard for Private Entities (HKFRS for Private Entities) issued by the Hong Kong Institute of Certified Public Accountants and the requirements of the Hong Kong Companies Ordinance. They have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

### (b) Property, plant and equipment

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses.

Depreciation is charged so as to allocate the cost of assets less their residual values over their estimated useful lives, using the straight-line method. The following annual rates are used for the depreciation of property, plant and equipment:

Leasehold improvements 20%

Computer equipment 33%

If there is an indication that there has been a significant change in depreciation rate, useful life or residual value of an asset, the depreciation of that asset is revised prospectively to reflect the new expectations.

#### (c) Impairment of non-financial assets

At each reporting date, property, plant and equipment are reviewed to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If there is an indication of possible impairment, the recoverable amount of any affected asset (or group of related assets) is estimated and compared with its carrying amount. If an estimated recoverable amount is lower, the carrying amount is reduced to its estimated recoverable amount, and an impairment loss is recognised immediately in surplus or deficit.

If an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset (or group of related assets) is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but not in excess of the amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset (or group of related assets) in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised immediately in surplus or deficit.

#### 2 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (cont'd)

#### (d) Operating leases

Leases where substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of assets remain with the leasing company are accounted for as operating leases. Rentals applicable to such operating leases are charged to the statement of income and general fund as incurred over the lease term.

Rentals payable under operating leases are charged to surplus or deficit on a straight-line basis over the term of the relevant lease.

### (e) Recognition of revenue

Revenue is recognised when it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the company and when revenue can be measured reliably, on the following bases:

- \* project income earmarked for specific purposes are initially recognised as deferred income. When there is reasonable assurance that the company will comply with the conditions attaching to the project, they are recognised in the statement of income and general fund over the period necessary to match with the related costs which they are intended to compensate.
- \* donations are recognised when the right to receive payment is established.
- \* interest on a time proportion basis that takes into account the effective yield on the asset.

#### (f) Employee benefits

- i) Salaries, discretionary bonuses, paid annual leave and the cost to the company of non-monetary benefits are accrued in the period in which the associated services are rendered by employees of the company. Where payment or settlement is deferred and the effect would be material, these amounts are stated at their present values.
- ii) The company operates a Mandatory Provident Fund scheme ("MPF scheme") for the employees. Contributions are made based on a percentage of the employee's basic salaries and are charged to the statement of income and general fund as they become payable. The assets of the MPF Scheme are held in an independently administered fund. The company's contributions vest fully with the employees when contributed into the MPF Scheme.

#### (g) Receivables

Receivables are recognised initially at the transaction price. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the effect of discounting would be immaterial, in which case they are stated at cost, less provision for impairment. A provision for impairment of trade receivables is established when there is objective evidence that the company will not be able to collect all amounts due according to the original terms of the receivables.

#### (h) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand and demand deposits with original maturities of three months or less.

#### 2 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (cont'd)

#### (i) Payables

Payables are recognised initially at the transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the effect of discounting would be immaterial, in which case they are stated at cost.

#### 3 TAXATION

No provision for Hong Kong profits tax is made in the financial statements as the company is an approved charitable institution, and has obtained exemption from Hong Kong profits tax.

# 4 DIRECTORS' REMUNERATION (EQUIVALENT TO KEY MANAGEMENT PERSONNEL COMPENSATION)

During the year ended 31 March 2023 and the period from 5 May 2021 (date of incorporation) to 31 March 2022, no amounts have been paid in respect of directors' emoluments, directors' pensions or for any compensation to directors or past directors in respect of loss of office.
